Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B, August 26th, 2018. Bulletin No: 1230.

A so-called 'born Catholic' woke up one day and got a shock. It suddenly dawned on him that he was not a volunteer but a conscript. I don't know what triggered off this line of thought in him. But for the first time in his life he realised that everything relating to the faith had been given to him. It was all second-hand, like clothes handed down to him from an older brother.

Now as a young adult it had suddenly hit him. He had accepted it all unthinkingly. He had never made his faith his own. But what bothered him most was the fact that he had never been consulted about it. He had never been offered the opportunity to make a personal choice about his faith.

It was a worrying moment for him, and a dangerous one too. But it also carried great possibilities. He was being given a chance to make a personal choice regarding the faith.

It is no longer enough to be born into the faith. A second-hand faith is an impoverished faith. It will not do us, especially in hard times. 'A knowledge of religion, as distinguished from experience, seems but chaff in moments of trial' (Gandhi).

As we go through life, things happen to us which cause us either to make this faith our own and to try to live it with some conviction, or to drift away from it. For some, the transformative experiences may be quiet and undramatic. Others have their beliefs transformed by painful experiences such as addiction, or war experiences, or the loss of a loved one...

We need to make the faith our own. We have to find meaning in it through personal experience if it is to come alive for us. But we have to be clear what that word 'faith' involves. It is not in the first place the acceptance of a set of beliefs, but a belief in, and commitment to, the person of Jesus.

The Lord himself is the one who strengthens our faith. But we also need to confirm one another. Our presence at the Sunday Eucharist can make both of these things happen


